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WELCOME BACK - IMPORTANT: PLEASE READ!

Are you ready for a new quilting year? We have lots planned, so stay tuned! You can also sign up for a new mystery quilt with clues distributed monthly. These are always fun.

A big change this year involves the setup for our meetings. Unfortunately, Matt, the church custodian, has injured his back and will no longer be able to set up the tables and chairs for us. (UGH, I know.) We're hoping that everyone who is able will help with setup and any takedown that is required. To disperse the work, those who are designated by the first letter of their last name to bring refreshments for the month will also be responsible for setting up tables and chairs. Understandably, not everyone is able to help, but if you can, *please* arrive early on your assigned month and help set up, and help clean up after the meeting. Thanks to everyone, in advance, for their cooperation and help.

FOLDED FABRIC ORNAMENTS WORKSHOP

Everyone is welcome to stay after the September meeting for this workshop. No sewing machine is required. Thanks to the workshop instructors, member Sue Dankelmann and her daughter Jennifer Clarke! Please contact them if you have specific questions about the workshop or supplies.

You can make a folded pine cone ornament or a folded ball ornament. Both of these folded fabric ornaments are easy and fun to make. You can personalize them with your choice of fabrics or the embellishments you choose to add. You can make them for Christmas, Valentine's Day, showers, and more! They make great gifts for teachers, neighbors, and friends. But, a warning: ornament making is highly addictive!

Supplies for the folded pine cone ornament:

- 3" Styrofoam egg
- 150-200 straight pins (dressmaker pins 1-1/16" (27 mm) preferred)
- 120-130 2" squares of fabric
- Hot glue gun supplied
- Ribbon (to make the hanger)
- Beads, bows, berries, bells, etc. for embellishments
- Hard thimble (plastic or metal)

Supplies for the folded ball ornament:

- 3" round Styrofoam ball
- 150-200 straight pins (dressmaker pins 1-1/16" (27 mm) preferred)
- 42 total 2-1/2" squares of fabric (10 squares for the star center color, 16 for the middle color, and 16 for the outside color)
- 2" x 12" strip of fabric (preferably of the outside color)
- 1" x 12" scrap of batting (1 piece per ornament)
- Flexible tape measure
- Sharpie marker
- Hot glue gun supplied
- Ribbon (to decorate outside of the ornament and make the hanger)
- Beads, bows, berries, bells, etc. for embellishments
- Hard thimble (plastic or metal)

CAROL WEBER, PICTORIAL AND LANDSCAPE QUILTER IN OCTOBER

Local art quilter Carol Weber visits Wiltwyck on October 19. Carol has won many prizes for her art quilts, including several challenge pieces in which she interpreted famous art masters' paintings in fabric. She will present the lecture "The Making of a Landscape Quilt." Half-Day Workshop, "Machine Landscape Techniques": Saturday, October 19, 1:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. at Grace Church. Limit: 20 students. Cost: \$20 for Wiltwyck members (\$25 for non-members).

You will be using your sewing machine, Carol will teach raw edge appliqué, thread painting, freestanding threadwork, and free motion quilting techniques. You'll create a reference booklet of techniques useful in creative quilting. This workshop is not to be missed if you have always wanted to learn how to make spectacular art quilts. LACEY HILL, WEARABLES AND QUILT DESIGNER IN NOVEMBER

Lacey J. Hill of Golden Thyme Designs, who hails from Hillsdale, NJ, will be our guest in November. You can visit her Web site at http://laceyjhill.com/. She describes herself as "a self-professed Fabric-aholic. I love color and my stash reproduces spontaneously!" Sound familiar?

Church Full-Day Workshop, "Jackets that Fit Your Style": Friday, November 15, 9:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. at Grace Church. Sizes: 0-5 (XSmall-2X) Limit: 20 students. Cost: \$40 for Wiltwyck members (\$45 for non-members), includes \$10 pattern fee. Your choice of the jacket style: Asian Inspiration or Keystone Jacket.

The Keystone jacket requires more piecing than the Asian one. Each section of this jacket uses a different technique. The sleeves of the Asian Inspiration jacket might look pieced, but it's actually an all-over large-scale Kona Bay fabric. Both jackets patterns can be altered to fit each person's fabric choices. We'll be planning out the jackets in class so you will have a definite plan of action to take home. The jacket pattern is based on the rectangle, so construction of the jacket is similar to a quilt. A simple fabric foundation technique is used for the layout and design. The foundation fabric can be muslin, fleece, or flannel, so the drape of the jacket is flowing rather than stiff. In this workshop each participant will design and create a jacket that fits her unique size and personality. The jacket may be as elaborate or sedate as you wish.

The goal is to create a jacket that "Fits Your Style." There will be sample jackets in each size available for determining the basic size. With measuring tapes in hand, we will adjust the pattern to accommodate different cup sizes and varying sleeve and hem lengths. You will leave the workshop with a pattern that fits your personal proportions.

Because wearable art is very personal, the fabrics we quilt with may not necessarily be the fabrics we would wear. Look in your closet and see which color looks best on you. Then design your jacket around that color scheme. Bring an assortment of fabrics ranging from light to dark. You will use darker fabrics toward the side seams and lighter fabrics in the middle of the panels.

The first half hour to 45 minutes of the workshop is fitting and design ideas. Throughout the day, we will be discussing ways for you to use your current quilting techniques to personalize your jacket.

"Half Wearables and Half Quilts & Wearables Using Large Scale Prints" Lecture and Trunk Show: Saturday, November 16, at Grace Church.

This lecture and trunk show is a combination of two of Lacey's lectures. We'll get a sampling of "It's All about the Fabric! Working With Large-Scale Prints in Quilting" and "Jackets That Fit Your Style."

Using large-scale prints in quilting can be challenging as well as confusing. Let's say a great large-scale print caught your eye & you had to have it! Yes, we love to pet our fabric, but let's USE IT! See how fabric pattern and design can create a quilt that sizzles using those wonderful large-scale fabrics. This part of the lecture includes quilts and wearables using large-scale fabrics.

Creating wearable art can be a journey! As Quilters making wearable art we need to look at our fabric in a stylish manner. How can we use our fabrics to enhance our figures? Let's highlight our positives and diminish problem spots. All this can be done quite effectively with the use of color, fabric pattern and what Lacey calls "drapability" of design. Approximately 12-15 jackets will be presented.

Volunteer to be a model & you too can "strut your stuff on the runway!"

Half-Day Workshop, "Panel Play": Saturday, November 16, 12:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. at Grace Church. Limit: 20 students. Cost: \$25 for Wiltwyck members (\$30 for non-members).

Take a lovely 20"-24" x 40" - 44" panel, add coordinates in a "strippy" fashion, and you'll have a lovely, super quick wall quilt. We'll be using quick strip piecing methods to make the blocks along with modified Flying Geese. A large scale border is optional, and the wall quilt has self bound edge. Lacey will have the panel shown on the supply sheet available if you are interested. Lacey will be sharing lots of time saving tips that can be incorporated into your traditional quilting.

COMMUNITY QUILT SIZE INFORMATION

If you would like to work on a Community Service quilt at home, the sizes are as follows: Shelter quilts $-40'' \times 48''$ or larger with batting. Quilted or tied.

Nursing home quilts – 36" x 48" and **no batting**. Flannel backing is good for these because they do not slide off easily. Quilted or tied. Directions for the walker pockets and wheel chair pockets are on the Guild web page.

FAT QUARTER RAFFLE



WILTWYCK QUILTERS' GUILD SEPTEMBER 2013 RAFFLE BLOCK FLYING SQUARES

PEGGY CAHILL 845-331-2742 MARY MC LAUGHLIN 845-336-5523

We will make a traditional 10" pieced block utilizing the partial seam technique.



READ ALL INSTRUCTIONS BEFORE BEGINNING. MAKE A PRACTICE BLOCK FIRST.

FABRICS: No fabric is supplied.

Scraps: eight different coordinating mediums and darks, each 2 ½" X 2 ½". Background: creamy muslin or cream-on-cream (NO WHITES OR COLORS)

five 2 1/2" x 2 1/2" and four 6 1/2" X 2 1/2"

PREPARATION:

Lay out the pieces according to the diagram, placing the colored squares to your liking.

SEWING: Use a 1/4" seam.

Center 9-patch:

- Sew three rows of three squares each. Press the seams in the rows toward the dark. Press the rows toward the center.
- Square up to 6 ½" X 6 ½"


Outer frame:

- Sew each of the remaining colored squares to the end of a muslin strip. Press toward the dark.
- ** Sew one of the strips to the top of the 9-patch as shown, starting at the last ½" of the cream block at the left. This will leave the beginning portion of the seam unsewn. This portion will be taken care of when the last seam is completed. Press away from the 9-patch.
- * Sew on the right edge strip, then the bottom strip, and then the left edge strip. Press each strip away from the center as you go around the 9-patch.
- ** Sew the remaining portion of the top edge seam, overlapping the initial stitching about ½". Press away from the center of the block.

Complete the block:

Press carefully and measure the block. It must measure 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " X 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Sign your name in a seam allowance.
