BLOCK OF THE MONTH

Each month Mary will put the BOM in the newsletter. You will mail your completed block to her. She will do the drawing and the winner will be sent all the blocks for that month.

Purchase 2-3 yards of complementary material. Each month do a practice block with that material. Then, at the end of the year you will have 9 blocks for your sampler quilt.

Wiltwyck Quilt Guild for October, 2020: BIRDS IN THE AIR

We will make a 10 ½" unfinished pieced block taken from Quilter's Newsletter, July/August, 1999 on pages 34-35, in a quilt made by Tina Garrett.

READ ALL DIRECTIONS...DO A PRACTICE BLOCK FIRST

Fabrics: Tan print: 10 7/8" square cut on one diagonal

Dark blue print: two 3 3/8" squares and three 3 1/2" squares

A lighter color scrap: three 3 ½" squares

Making the unit: Mark the diagonal one a 3 1/2" non-blue scrap. With right sides together, place this on top of a blue 3 1/2" square. Sew 1/4" on both sides of the marked line and cut on the marked line. Press to the blue and square up to 3".

Repeat this with the other two pairs of 3 ½" squares to get six half-square triangles.

Cut the two 3 3/8" blue squares on the diagonal to get four triangles.


LAY OUT AS SHOWN:

Sew the columns first and press in the direction of the arrows. Next sew the rows together, press in the direction of the arrows.

Make sure this unit has a 90 corner at bottom left.

Mark the center of the longest side of the triangle by folding over the corners and finger press the center. Line this center point with the top of the small middle triangle of the other large unit. Sew the triangular unit to the large triangle on the longest side and press to the tan.

Square it up to 10 ½" and sign your name in the seam allowance and MAIL it to Mary McLaughlin.



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
