HI Everyone,

Te and I wanted to take the time to make sure everyone is in the loop as to how program/workshops are running. There has been quite a lot of change in the world since the onset of COVID two years ago. One of the main things is the use of Zoom for instruction/classes, which a lot of presenters are now doing and will continue to do so. Many have not gone back to traveling and I don't believe they will, but here is looking to the bright side of this even though a lot of you have expressed interest in attending in person classes. The Zoom classes give everyone a front row seat to viewing what the instructor is teaching while you are in the comfort of your own home with all your supplies at your fingertips. (And no one says we can't get together, have a class either as a group or with a few friends and just Zoom our instructor in.) We have options that makes this work for everyone, including our friends from distant places who we enjoy seeing. We are also able to use the funds we save on travel expenses to allow for more distance instructors and even some we might like that are slightly more costly to have and couldn't afford to otherwise.

We are trying to be responsible with our funds while also planning for future successful programming. After a discussion at the board meeting, we realized that we won't have to give up any workshops and/or lectures (we do 5-6 a year depending if it is a show year) if we know how many people are going to attend the workshop in advance. I know many don't know what they might be doing in a couple of months but I am looking for those that are interested in a workshop to sign up more than 30 days before. The reason for this is that most presenters have a 30 day cancellation policy. I know we have not cancelled workshops due to low attendance in the past (at least during my 3 years) but the workshops will not pay for themselves. If we continue in this way the guild as a whole cannot afford to cover that much of the cost and be successful in the future. With that said, the Board agreed that we need 50% cost coverage by that 30 day window or the class will have to be cancelled. However, as long as the instructor agrees, the lecture alone, without the workshop, will continue. This also does not mean you can't sign up after that 30 day window as long as the class still exists. This is just a guide to ensure success. Please keep in mind that the prices we charge for these wonderful classes are lower than most other guilds charge which means we need more attendees to make that work.

At this time I have scheduled through Spring of 2023 and all are Zoom programs. However, we are exploring hybrid options and using the classroom at the church. My goal is to fulfill individual member's needs with what draws them to being part of the group to the best of my ability by giving them the option to stay home, go to a friend's home, or come to the church. Let's work together to make our guild and our program a successful one.

## **BLOCK OF THE MONTH**


## March and April 2022

We're giving you more time since the April meeting is early

"Easy Peasy"

KANSAS CITY STAR

We will make a 10 ½" pieced unfinished block. The name came from the Encyclopedia of Pieced Quilts written by Barbara Brackman on p. 160-161. The quilt idea came from Quick and Easy Quilts, Feb/Mar 2022 on pp 58-61. It was designed and made by Jane Vaughan. The original block was 8" square so I adapted it to make a finished 10" block.



READ ALL INSTRUCTIONS BEFORE BEGINNING. MAKE A PRACTICE BLOCK FIRST

Fabrics: 1) Creamy muslin: one 6 ¾" square, one 7 ¾" square

2) Blue, pink or purple floral print: four 3 7/8" squares, one 7 %" square

Suggestions on cutting: 1) Cut two 8" squares of your floral; square one up to 7 %" and cut the second Into four 3 7/8" squares

2) Cut two muslin pieces 7 ¾" and cut one down to a 6 ¾" square

Preparation: On the back of the 7 3/4" muslin square, draw two diagonals and on the back of the four

floral 3 7/8" squares, draw one diagonal.

Making the four flying geese: With right sides together, place a floral 3 7/8" square on the corner of 6 ¾" muslin square with the diagonal line in the corner; place a second square in the opposite corner as shown. Sew ¾" on each side of the line. Press to the small triangles. On each of these units, place one of the remaining 3 7/8" squares on the bottom corner With right sides together and sew ¾" on each side of the line. Cut on the line and press to the small triangles, giving you four Flying geese units. Size up to a 3" x 5 ½" rectangle.

Making the eight half-square units: Lay out the two 7 %" squares with

Right sides together and muslin on the top. Sew %" on each side of both diagonals.

Cut vertically and horizontally in the middle to get four equal squares; cut along the marked lines in each section to make eight half-square units; press to the muslin and square up to 3"

Sewing the lock: Lay out as shown:

Sew the four half-squares in the center first and press the last seam open. Sew together in 3 rows and then in 2 columns and press. Square up to 10 ½" and sign Your name in the seam allowance on the back.
